Veerachan Usahanun Born on 18 December 1960 in Uttaradit province, Northern Thailand. Studied at the College of Fine Arts in Bangkok, and then moved to Vienna, Austria, where he studied and worked as a professional artist mentoring several of the most respected members of the European art community. Veerachan exhibited his worked several times in Europe between 1991 and 1999, mostly in Austria.

After 11 years in Europe, he returned to Thailand with his worked "The Fantasy Portraits" exhibited at Ground Floor Gaysorn Plaza, Bangkok in 2000.

In 2002, Veerachan unveiled his four meter high sculpture and painting on teak wood titled "The Three Worlds" which was commissioned by the private Museum of Thailand Contemporary Arts in Bangkok. The massive art piece took three years to complete. After completing "The Three Worlds", Veerachan embarked on a unique series of works titled "The Miracles of Ganesha" depicting the Hindu elephantine deity Ganesha in contemporary recreations of god's traditional postures. The collection now numbers sixteen original works on board and canvas.

Veerachan is currently based in Phuket, Thailand, working from his studio and gallery near Bang Tao Beach, where visitors are welcome to view "The Miracles of Ganesha" collection. Here, Veerachan draws on the inspiration offered by the sea and tropical surroundings, and continues to produce "miracle" works of art.

The Miracles of Ganesha Collection

Veerachan's contemporary depictions of Ganesha are stunning, erotic and thought provoking. The collection of incredibly powerful and intricate paintings depicts the Hindu deity in various traditional postures. As the paintings are so full of detail, at first sight, it can be difficult to see the contemporary connection with traditional poses, but Veerachan has considered, and can answer questions, about every detail and you soon understand that he has pondered every aspect of traditional Ganesha worship.

All his paintings are heavily laced with elements of eroticism, but Veerachan does not intend to offend religious sensibilities by his choice of subject matter. Rather, he is simply depicting a completely normal aspect of human nature.

Veerachan is aware that for many his way of depicting the Elephantine god from Hindu mythology is "too strong", but he is adamant that his artwork had worked under his surrender to the God of Art. Veerachan says "All paintings in this collection are painted from my deepest concentration to transcend the limitations of human thought and emotion. I have surrendered myself to the Miracle of Ganesha, and pray respect to his kindness which leads me to find the way of peacefulness till I could paint this collection."

The Miracles of Ganesha Collection has made a big impression on the Thailand art scene with several exhibitions and appreciation from art critics and art collectors around the world."




The Three Worlds Project

Standing 4 meters high, the Three Worlds sculpture painting was commissioned by a businessman whose own gallery features Thailand's most prominent contemporary artists. Veerachan's Three Worlds is his biggest piece so far and is also the largest single piece of artwork in the Ben-cha-chin-da building's arts museum in Bangkok.

The Three Worlds took over two years to complete and was originally commissioned as a fantasy portrait. Following discussions, the emphasis was taken off the portrait concept to a broader perspective that is related to anyone who experiences the power of this magnificent sculpture. The hands of the subject push down on the evil influences of karma pasts and temptations while seeking on a higher plane. Above the head, spheres represent the notable phases of life, from birth to death.


The Three Worlds refer to the physical world we live in and the heaven and hell above below us. Around the face, a sea of writhing bodies represented humanity in its barest, most animal form.

Ordering a fantasy Portrait

Fantasy portraits can be ordered in any size or technique, depending on the client's wishes.

Step 1 : Send photograph(s) and biography of subject to the Artist.

Step 2 : Discuss and make basic Sketch of fantasy portrait concept with artist Veerachan.

Step 3 : Artist Veerachan works on representational sketch of agreed concept.

Step 4 : Upon completion of the fantasy portrait sketch, the final concept is agreed between the client and artist


